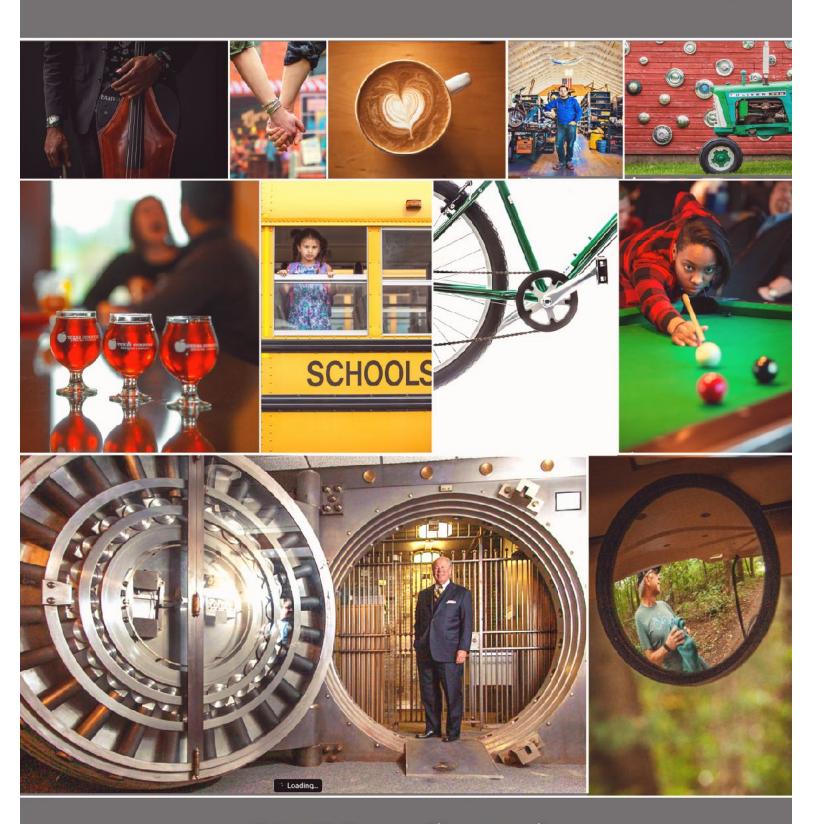

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1. **RULE OF THIRDS:** Make active use of imaginary grid to place a the main subject on one of the covering thirds.







2. **BALANCED:** Symmetrical or asymmetrical, dividing the frame in half.



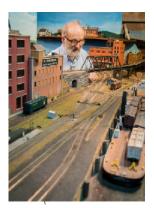




3. **LEADING LINES:** Use S or C curve & straight lines to lead into a frame.









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4. FRAME WITHIN A FRAME: Using a frame inside the image.







5. **REPETITION:** Using three or more similar objects.







6. **TRUNCATION:** cutting off to enhance edge dynamics and help the viewer focus.







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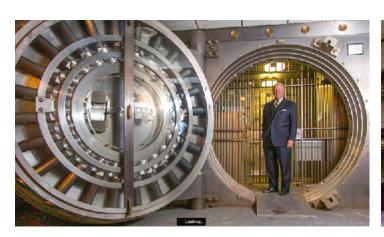
7. **NEGATIVE SPACE**: Using empty space to surround and bring focus to the main subject.







8. **POINT OF REFERENCE:** emphasizing size relationship.





9. **SELECT FOCUS:** using shallow depth of field to enhance a subject.







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10.POINT OF VIEW: Using angles other than eye level to enhance the point of view.
